Chennai is one of the hotspot destinations as it houses number of manufacturing industries, construction sites, hospitality sectors and other avenues. Migrants in sites are more in need of assistance. BMS comes in to assists in ways viable. Our experience with BMS saw us various centres of the activities. The first hand experience with migrants shed light to the plight. Factory workers and construction sites often live in a situation of survival. The BMS acts as a bridging body. It comes to rescue the migrants in possible ways. It helps the migrants to connect the government and the culture. It provides holistic development to the workers. It is a kind of moral support in need. It touches all aspects of human growth of the workers. The days with BMS reaches to the homes of migrant workers. We wit-

nessed living conditions, listened to the status, and talked to them. The need of the people is not only work but also care and concern about the welfare. Though BMS's outreach is limited it brings smile

to the people which we believe will continue to spread.

There are numbers of workers from North East India in Chennai. Ranging from salesperson, hospitality staff, security guard, beauty parlour spa etc. are dotted with workers from North East. The working conditions also in general is not appreciative. The working hours are long. The rented place to stay which are not so conducive. Priority is given to work alone and other interets are kept aside. Spiritual needs are neglected as often and do not get off day on Sundays. Migrants are sometimes subjected to exploitation by the landlords and the employers. BMS in some ways come to rescue them by raising voices for them.




DB4M SPEARHEADS ONLINE CAPACITY BUILDING MEETING

Fr. Bosco provided an overview of capacity building efforts on implementation and its significance in the context of migration and migration-related issues, in-



cluding governance, policy development, right to education, better protection for migrants' rights. Many participants raised questions about their present difficulties regarding the implementation of migrant rights and Fr. Bosco suggested and gave solutions to implement and overcome the issues and challenges.

RIP MIGRANT WORKER

e we sadly report that one of the migrant women experienced a cardiac arrest and passed away. She was admitted to Savita hospital where her death was confirmed. Subsequently, her body was transferred Sriperumbudur Government Hospital. Unfortunately, the victim's husband and other migrant workers were unsure about the procedures involved in filing a case with the po-



lice. Thankfully, Fr. Roshan and the Ponnamallee Sacred Heart brothers came forward and assisted in obtaining the body. Initially, plans were made to send the body to Odisha, but after considering the wishes of the workers, arrangements were made for cremation in Sriperumbudur with the help of the local authorities. With the necessary permission from the local authority, the cremation was successfully carried out. The workers expressed their sincere gratitude for the assistance provided.

he DBMS has organised labour welfare program for the construction workers on 5th of August 2023. The event started at 5pm, where 45 workers participated.

had DBMS First aid demonstrations session by Mr. Elangovan. He demonstrated basic first aid techniques to the workers, such as Bleeding control, Fractures, Sprains and strains, Electric shock. Heat exhaustion and heat stroke. The workers also practiced first aid techniques with Mr. Elangovan and ensured that all workers know how to respond effectively in case of emergencies. He gave knowledge about emergency help number to the workers. Mr. Deepak shared on the following topic on Benefits and Coverage. He explained the various benefits and services provided by the construction welfare schemes, such as health insurance, medical check-ups, accident

coverage, disability benefits, and education assistance, etc. The session was preceded by TNCWWB-Enrolment Process, described the steps involved in enrolling the government schemes, the required documents and its benefits. The workers were introduced to Rights and Protections, explained to the educated workers about



their rights under the ISM Act- 1979, and under Building and Other Construction Workmen Act-1996 and how they are protected from exploitation or unfair treatment. The program emphasized the importance of safety guidelines and precautions on construction sites, as well as the resources available to ensure a safe working environment.

The basic objective is informed to workers about the mechanism for addressing complaints or concerns related to their working conditions. The programme highlighted training and skill development opportunities provided by the TNCWWB to enhance their career prospects.

It provided DB4M help line contact number, information and the help by administrators or representatives where workers can reach out for assistance or information. Later on Sr. Madhu shared the topic on Substance Addiction. Most of the workers were affected by the substance addiction, which leads them to destroy their precious life and the families too. She enlightened the workers with many examples about the causes of substance addiction. Finally, we thanked the participants, AE, PM and those who helped to make the event successful. Hope, the labour welfare program may bring positive changes and to have better overall wellbeing.
